People curious about homeowner benefits in the [Inflation Reduction Act](#), [solar rebates](#) and [do-it-yourself energy improvements](#) can talk to experts in design, construction and community planning during [Sustainable Building Week](#) from Oct. 10-15 in the Portland area.

About 30 events, many free, presented online or in person, cover a wide range of topics, from [upgrading home electrical panels](#) by [Electrify Now](#) to [rethinking ways to prevent wildfire](#) by [Sustainable Northwest Wood](#) as well as [re-imaging schoolyards](#) by [Oregon Green Schools](#) and Oregon's chapter of the [American Society of Landscape Architects](#).

Go inside 10 new, well-insulated homes that offer easy livability and low utility costs at the Home Builders Association of Metro Portland's 2022 Homes of Tomorrow Today Tour Oct. 14-16 (\$25, homesoftomorrowpdx.com).

Tour goers will hear about ways to upgrade a home, from replacing an inefficient water heater to installing alternative energy sources that can be used during power outages.

They will see smart thermostats, solar panels and electric car charging stations. Kitchens are outfitted with induction cooktops and the temperature of a whole house can be consistently comfortable with cost-saving heat pumps.

Interest in reducing home expenses while protecting the planet has grown since Sustainable Building Week started five years ago.

This year, event founders Webly Bowles and Terry Campbell introduced a year-round program, Sustainable Building Monthly, with talks held in Portland's PAE Living Building.

The five-story, brick-clad structure at 151 S.W. First Ave. generates its own power, collects and treats its own water, and composts its waste.

Discriminatory housing policies and lending practices are the focus of ZERO Coalition and the Portland Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority's film program 5 p.m.-8 p.m. on Thursday, Oct. 13 at the June Key Delta Community Center, 5940 N. Albina Ave. in North Portland's Humboldt neighborhood.

A discussion by Birdsmouth Design-Build on how homes can benefit from zero-energy retrofits using off-the-shelf products takes place 5:45 p.m.-8 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 14, at Steeplejack Brewing Company, 2400 N.E. Broadway in Northeast Portland's Sullivan Gulch neighborhood.
